Gulfport building activities for the first six and one-half months of 1950 topped the million dollar mark in estimated valuation. The Gulfport city hall reported today that the building boom has brought in new construction to Gulfport at a rate twice as fast as in 1949.

The past week, which accounted for \$80,500 in new construction, brought planned changes for two more sections of the rapidly changing Great Southern Hotel property. F. S. Demeter, owner of the Great Southern, was given permission to erect two new automobile service stations south of the hotel and fronting the proposed extension of US Highway 90 south of the building.

Plans for the stations might be shelved temporarily if no change occurs in the state highway department's previously announced plan to give up the highway project through Gulfport as in 1949.
