Training School Begins for Police
The annual FBI training school conducted by the Gulfport police department under the supervision of Assistant Chief Richard Hart, got underway Monday afternoon with 12 members of the police force as students.
Instructors for the school are J. M. Lopez, assistant special agent in charge, FBI, New Orleans; Martin W. Clift, special agent, FBI, New Orleans; Perry V. Richardson, special agent, FBI, New Orleans; Gaston Hewes, county attorney; Robert Buntin, city attorney; and Captain Hart.
Students are Capt. Judson Locke, Patrolmen L. D. Atkinson, Robert Letourneau, Herman H. Lott, Luther Robinson, Edward Resh, Ora Mock, F. H. Barnett, Z. H. Durr, colored; Malchi K. Lee, colored, and desk sergeant S. H. Davis.
Subjects of instruction include law enforcement as a profession, practical crime scene researches, court room demeanor, city ordinances, burglary investigations and care and use of firearms, including actual firing demonstrations on the police range.

Renovation Of Swimming Pools At Field Studied
The renovation of two swimming pools at Gulfport Field is among a number of projects the Gulfport Kiwanis Club is planning to undertake in the near future in an effort to secure additional recreation facilities for the citizens and visitors of the Gulfport area. Jack Carter, committee member, reported that it was determined at a recent meeting of Kiwanis that in order to hold visitors to Gulfport, they should be provided varied entertainment, including spectacular sporting events that will draw additional crowds in off-seasons when the Coast has plenty of accommodations to offer.
This can be accomplished, it was pointed out, by having the facilities to sponsor "big-time" events as exhibition games between big league baseball teams, golf tournaments, swim meets, tennis championship matches, live stock shows, county fairs, industrial exhibits and many other events.
The Kiwanis Club will begin its task by urging local civic organizations to join in asking for the two idle swimming pools located at Gulfport Field. If the city of Gulfport sees fit to turn them over to civic organizations, the citizens will be the beneficiaries of pools that would cost at least \$100,000 to duplicate, Mr. Carter explained.
The pools are in some need of repair and are not equipped with diving boards and showers; diving boards will be needed, a wire fence must be installed for safety purposes, some few health standards must be approved, life guards should be furnished, and bathing suits and towels should also be made available to those who wish to rent them, it was reported.
"We will need the wholehearted support of all civic groups, Boy Scouts, youngsters of swimming and other interested citizens to prevent the financial arrangements from becoming a burden on those who are determined to see the project finished," Mr. Carter said.
Estimates are not yet available as to the financial structure of the project, but they will be made public as soon as possible. The committee appointed by the Kiwanis Club for the project includes Mr. Carter, Dr. R. N. Cahill, Jim Allen, Dick Hart, E. P. Cahill, Bob Buntin and Dr. Fred Bradshaw.




